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Why is this research being conducted

The purpose of this study is to build upon our previous work (GU Ref No: 2018/536) to now investigate the perceived factors that may impact patients' adherence to sustained activity-based therapy programs.

Therefore the objective of this particular study is to collate and analyse survey feedback from spinal cord injured (SCI) persons and/or their carers to develop comprehensive educational tools.

What you are being asked to do

Participants will be asked to partake in a short 15-20min online survey. Quantitative responses (age, type of injury, time since injury, perceptions of activity-based therapies) will remain anonymous.

The expected benefits of the research

It is expected that this research will identify potential factors that may influence SCI patient's adherence to activity-based therapies. Research results will be disseminated via journal articles and/or conference presentations, and may also be made available via the PCSCRF and Spinal Life Australia websites.

Your confidentiality

All the information about your participation in this study will be kept confidential. You do not need to provide your name or any other identifying information. All research data (survey responses and analysis) will be retained in a password protected electronic file at Griffith University for a period of five years before being destroyed

Your participation is voluntary

Your participation is voluntary and you do not need to answer any question unless you wish to do so. If you decide not to participate you can be assured that this decision will in no way impact upon your relationship with the University. The survey will be anonymous and all information collected will be unidentifiable.

Risks to you
